Message from the Provost

Hi. We are now in to the last few weeks of the semester. While this is typically the quieter part of the term, with focus of students on writing papers and exams and faculty members focused on grading papers and exams. However, this term, the College is a buzz with the refurbishment work underway. We are pleased with the support and work from MUN Facilities Management Team and Darwin Cromwell Painting contractors. The students and faculty members have been great in adjusting to room changes and pitching in with moving things around. We are confident the work will be completed in December and we will be back to normal for the start of the winter semester.



We are planning a Queen's College Open House for Sunday, February 02, 2020, from 2:00 to 4:00 p.m. Please plan to drop along and see the space and hear about some of our work at Queen's College.

The Provost Recruitment Committee is busy with screening applications and preparing for the interview phase. I understand that the Committee is pleased with the response to the advertisement. The Recruitment Committee had a consultation session with students and a session with faculty members on November 07. The Committee also invited input by e-mail to help them prepare for the task of selecting a new Provost.

At Queen's College, we have been working hard to ensure we are offering courses and programs that match the needs and interests of those called to serve as clergy and laity in the Church and in the community. An important part of our mission and mandate is to prepare people for ordained ministry. We have adjusted our programs to provide theological education and pastoral training across the province and beyond. Our students receiving the education and competencies to be ordained are to the priesthood and to the diaconate. These are all Queen's College students and graduates. We also have student and graduates bringing the benefits of their theological education and pastoral training to the world through the professions and careers such a social workers, teachers, physicians, nurses, police officers, lawyers, heavy equipment operators, food service workers, retail and manufacturing, and we could go on. Many are volunteers who enrich the community by their participation.

Just this week, we have established a new collaboration with the Order of St. Lazarus to design and deliver a training program for pastoral care and palliative care volunteers within the four Regional Health Authorities (RHAs). This collaboration between the RHAs, the Order of St. Lazarus and Queen's is another opportunity to ensure our mission effectiveness. The Order of St. Lazarus is contributing \$10,000 this venture.

The Queen's College Appeal will be Sunday February 09, 2020 throughout the three dioceses. Needless to say, we will be promoting the Appeal and asking for support. In the meantime, I ask your suggestions on how we might better advertise the Appeal and make more people aware of the work of Queen's College.

Finally, as we approach the Advent Season, please pray for Queen's College and pray that people will continue to discern and discover the call to ministry for all baptized people and for some to special ministry as ordained deacons, priests and bishops. In addition, never be shy to suggest to someone that they may have a vocation, and do not be afraid to consider it yourself.

Meet the Staff



Emily Rowe is the librarian at Queen’s College. She is a graduate of the University of King’s College, Halifax where she earned an advanced major in History with minors in English and Comparative Religion. Emily first moved to Newfoundland in 2002, and has lived in Woody Point, Heart’s

The Rev. Jane Allen is a student of Queen’s College in the B.TH By Distance program, and has been a priest for the past five months at St. James Anglican Church, Port aux Basques. She started her courses at Queen’s in January 2017 and completed her A.TH. Rev. Jane was ordained a deacon in June 2017. She now



has just one semester left for her Diploma in Theology (Deer Lake), that will be completed in Spring 2020 and will begin phase II of the Bachelor in Theology by distance in January 2020. She was

able to complete many of her courses online. With easy access to online webinars and classes she encourages other interested people to pursue study in theology. Rev. Jane says “the professors and instructors are very easy to access whenever you need help!”

Rev. Jane has always been involved in church and ministry: Junior Choir, Senior Choir, Sunday School teacher and superintendent, Vestry, ACW and Lay Minister. While she has always felt a call to ordained ministry, she kept putting it off until she could not ignore the call any longer. She was ordained a priest August 27, 2019. While there have been challenges in being both student and priest, Rev. Jane says “My dream and hope has been achieved, and to be able to serve God is a privilege.” Prior to her Queen’s College program, Rev. Jane worked in accounting. She and her husband James have two adult children and three wonderful grandchildren.

Linda Saunders-McLean has been a volunteer to the Happy Valley Moravian Church since July 1995. She has immensely enjoyed serving in all areas of the church from cleaning tables during the annual Moravian Women’s Fall

NEWS FROM THE GULF: (Archdeacon John Holdsworth)



The most striking feature of the Diocese of Cyprus and the Gulf is diversity, and so you could expect that our students will reflect that, and you wouldn't be wrong. We have students currently from Switzerland, South Africa, Nigeria, Canada, India, Sri Lanka, USA, Dubai, New Zealand and the UK. Many of them gathered in Beirut this summer for our first Diocesan Summer School, which augments what we call the Exploring Faith course, aka B.Th. in Ministry and Discipleship. We have few opportunities to gather together over a Diocese that covers 2000 miles and ten political jurisdictions, and we wanted to establish a sense of cohort amongst our learning community.

Shared worship, lectures, and Bible studies were combined with visits to some very interesting places. A visit to the Armenian Genocide Museum



in Byblos provided a reminder of the terrible inhumanity that lurks in the heart of humankind. But it also provided an inspiring example of

Christian witness. A tour of the Shatila refugee camp introduced attendees to the work of the Joint Christian Committee for Social Services, a Centre run by the committee provides skills training to young Palestinians and literacy classes for elderly women. We also visited a reconciliation education project in Sidon and St. Luke's Anglican Institute for Disabled Children, where some of the more musically talented visitors strutted their stuff.

Our students are enjoying their courses and are pleased to feel part of the larger family of Queen's. Next year we may well have graduates from here who will want to receive their degrees in Newfoundland and that would be a great way to cement relationships. As a Diocese we have made



representations about the kind of person we would like to see as the new Provost, but we shall be sad to see Provost Rick retire.

He has been a great support and inspiration to us. In the meantime, we hope to establish new learning groups to complement those that are meeting in Dubai, Abu Dhabi, Bahrain, Jebel Ali, Doha, Kuwait and two Centres in Cyprus.


