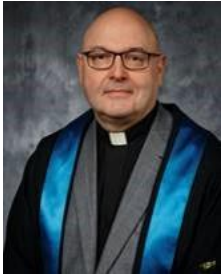

Greetings from the Provost

I wish to dedicate my part of the Newsletter this month as a personal tribute to Bishop Geoff Peddle.



The news of Bishop Geoff's death was a jolting shock to all on October 08. He and I had gone for breakfast and a meeting on October 07. We chatted about many things, some business, some matters of common interest, and some good-humored stories. We parted thanking each other for the time we spent together, and I was, as usual when I spent time with Geoff, enthused and hopeful for the Church and Queen's College.

Many friends and acquaintances have had comments on Bishop Geoff's life and ministry. They articulated it in different ways, many using examples from their experiences and observation of Bishop Geoff as one having the charism of a prophet in the 21st century: an authentic relationship with Jesus Christ through prayer; genuine articulation of what God calls us to in our time and place; and consistency between what is said and done. We know the initiatives of Bishop Geoff within the diocese, with the broader faith community of Newfoundland and Labrador, and in community-based collaborations and initiatives gives clear messaging of Geoff's heartfelt commitment to building the Kingdom of God. My tribute to Bishop Geoff's life and ministry brings to mind the inspired prayer – poem: Prophets of a Future Not Our Own.

*It helps, now and then, to step back and take a long view.
The kingdom is not only beyond our efforts, it is even
beyond our vision.*

*We accomplish in our lifetime only a tiny fraction of the
magnificent enterprise that is God's work.
Nothing we do is complete, which is a way of saying that
the Kingdom always lies beyond us.
No statement says all that could be said.
No prayer fully expresses our faith.
No confession brings perfection.
No pastoral visit brings wholeness.
No program accomplishes the Church's mission.
No set of goals and objectives includes everything.*

*This is what we are about.
We plant the seeds that one day will grow.
We water seeds already planted, knowing that they hold
future promise.*

*We lay foundations that will need further development.
We provide yeast that produces far beyond our
capabilities.
We cannot do everything, and there is a sense of
liberation in realizing that.
This enables us to do something, and to do it very well.*

*It may be incomplete, but it is a beginning, a step along
the way, an opportunity for the Lord's grace to enter and
do the rest.
We may never see the end results, but that is the
difference between the master builder and the worker.
We are workers, not master builders; ministers, not
messiahs.*

We have some very interesting courses and opportunities. We draw particular attention to a course on Missional Ministry in Urban and Rural Contexts. This course will give special focus to COVID-19 response and recovery.

We are also offering a course that will be a good training opportunity for bereavement ministry. We are in discussions with our partners in offering the Pastoral and Palliative Care Volunteer Training Certificate Program in the winter 2020. We hope to offer this grief and bereavement training in a similar way for potential volunteers. Stay tuned.

Day of Awareness The second Day of Awareness for this semester took place October 4th on line with students from all parts of our province as well as 2 in Greece and 1 in Nigeria. Immediately following Morning Prayer led by the community, The Ven Jotie Noel introduced all to his topic of **Franciscan Spirituality Splash - Immersion into Action & Contemplation.** Archdeacon Jotie's first talk was ***The Joy of Responding when God asks "Whaddya At?"***. He worked on the premise that how we live reflects what we actually believe, let's look backwards to discover who we are. How we spend our time, talent and treasure reveals where our heart is. (Matthew 6: 19-21) This talk concluded with a time of individual quiet reflection and contemplation on either of the Questions to Ponder:

1. In what ways do I check my ego tendencies to judge others?
2. In what ways do I cast aspersions or place distance between myself and the "other"?
3. How does my life address the Christian mandate to heal the wounds of injustice?
4. In what ways do I reach out in love to the 'lost' and marginalized?
5. What more can I do to serve as healer, peacemaker, and friend in Christ?

In his second talk Archdeacon Jotie then spoke on **The Joy of Being a "Hangashore"** based on his premise that the tendency for the task-oriented Church, the faith community, is to see persons at prayer as doing nothing, or being unproductive, what we in Newfoundland use to refer to such people as being a hangashore. Danger signals arise when clergy, called to be persons of prayer, believe this as well. (Matthew 6:6). He concluded with additional Questions to Ponder:

1. We pray as we are. How would I describe my relationship to prayer?
2. In what ways is my prayer life 'lean' / more habit than real intimacy with God?
3. How does prayer inspire and transform me?
4. What is my relationship with silence?
5. What experience do I have today of His presence within me?
6. How do I envision my mission as a servant leader?

Following some sharing, reflections, questions and experiences the day concluded with Mid Day Prayer led by the community.
