Biblical Studies 3000-Q: Introduction to the Old Testament

An introductory overview of the Old Testament. The course examines the individual books of the Old Testament as well as such topics as people, lands, methodology, sources, composition, history, etc. Special attention is given to the Torah, and in particular, Genesis, as the foundation for understanding the Old Testament. *This course is a prerequisite for all other Old Testament courses. This is a required course for MDiv, BTh, and MTS programs and a prerequisite for all advanced biblical studies courses.* It is recommended that students have The New Oxford Annotated NRSV with Apocrypha.

Biblical Studies 3211: An Ecological Reading of the Gospels

This course introduces students to an ecological interpretation of Scripture with a focus on the four Gospels. The biblical text is read from the perspective of Earth and the Earth community, discerning and retrieving texts which celebrate or oppress or make invisible Earth and other-than-human Earth creatures. It will make students aware of the legitimacy now given to an ecological interpretation of Scripture and the resources available to support this approach that is grounded in ecological thinking. Prerequisite: Biblical Studies 3000 & 3200-Q. It is recommended that students have The New Oxford Annotated NRSV with Apocrypha.

Pastoral Studies 3450-Q: Theology & Pastoral Care

Jesus was a revolutionary, whose message continues to challenge and transform human relationships with others and with creation. In this course we will explore the theological and scriptural foundations of the Church's Pastoral Care. We will have a particular focus on how trauma informs, challenges, shapes and guides pastoral care. Drawing upon the latest in trauma informed theory, the rich deposit of Theology and Scripture and a contextual understanding of our secular Newfoundland and Canadian culture, we will discuss and learn together about Pastoral Care and its relevance to the needs and issues of today.

This course provides an overview of the Old Testament. The purpose is two-fold. The first is to familiarize students with the content, historical context and theology of the Old Testament. The second is to introduce students to certain methodologies and resources that help us to understand and interpret the Old Testament. No previous scriptural study is expected or required. It is recommended that students have The New Oxford Annotated NRSV with Apocrypha.

Biblical Studies 2010-Q: Women in the Biblical World

In this course we will examine the lives and roles of women in the biblical world as told to us in ancient texts. Each week will focus on a different female figure (or figures), placing her/them within her/their historical and cultural contexts. We will read primary texts (e.g. Old Testament/Hebrew Bible, New Testament, Apocrypha) and secondary writings by scholars in the field of Biblical Studies. We will also consider our own modern biases and use different approaches to understanding the Biblical text (e.g. historical approach, feminist readings, and literary criticism).
